This increased the capabilities of our organization significantly.

During these two years, we were able to remodel and open two new Branches of our Centre, and begin the process of embodying our dream — the creation of a Supported Living Residence.

Dzherelo's staff are preparing for the Centre's substantial expansion in 2023. We have been joined by four municipal organizations which care for the elderly, including those with disabilities, for those that are homeless, and for children and families experiencing financial hardship. We are taking on this great responsibility to 2021 and 2022 were not straightforward for us; these were years of limitation, horrific war and new challenges.
Nevertheless, we could truly sense your solidarity and support as never before.

# Early Intervention Program 0-4 years

With the start of the full-scale invasion, weekly meetings were held in various formats to provide emotional support for parents.

Over 15 educational sessions for Early Intervention parents were offered and weekly live-streamed online sessions initiated, covering various important topics.

Participation in the work of the National Early Intervention Council, advocacy and contribution to the development of regulatory-legal documents.





# Centre for Medico-Social Rehabilitation 4-18 years


Given the circumstances, rehabilitation services were adapted to suit the needs of the parents with respect to frequency, duration and location — including occasional online consultation.

During the reporting period, over 2000 kits of foodstuff, hygiene items, and medicine were distributed and divided among families of children who participate in the main programs of Dzherelo.



# Day Program for children with disabilities aged 3–18 years

Due to certain restrictions and brief suspensions of services, Day Program activities were supplemented with online meetings, video activities and video recordings of thematic holiday performances by the children.



# Day Program for youth with disabilities aged 18-45

Due to interruptions in service provision because of the pandemic and war, Day Program services were supplemented with online meetings and recordings of special holiday events.

## How COVID 19 affected the Centre's activities

During the second wave of the pandemic in Ukraine, Dzherelo Centre was forced to suspend its services and for more than a month all of the children and youth were homebound. Work restarted only after 100% of staff were vaccinated. Emergence of symptoms required testing for team members and limitations were placed on visits by family and volunteers.

# Child Development Program

Over 220 children received diagnostic and special education services in this department. Services are provided on the basis of charitable contributions.



# Support during inclusive learning


In September 2022, we became a provider of support for 7 children with special educational needs participating in inclusive learning programs in general educational institutions of Lviv. They were given the opportunity to obtain an assistant for each child during their attendance in school in order to meet their social or everyday needs.

This service provides for an individualized approach to each child and allows access for a greater number of children to inclusive learning environments.



# Social Rehabilitation

We initiated a new program that gives children the chance to learn and develop skills such as preparing basic meals, using household appliances, using transportation, developing financial literacy, interacting socially with peers, learning household management and appropriate social skills in public settings. During this two year period, 26 children participated in the program.



# Workshop for repairing and adapting rehabilitation equipment

From the start of the war, the workload of the Rehabilitation Equipment Workshop increased drastically, as many people acquired disabilities, and during evacuation, lost or could not bring their wheelchairs or other equipment with them. Dzherelo staff distributed wheelchairs at the railway station and also passed on a large quantity of equipment to evacuation sites, provided services for the selection, adaptation and repair of equipment to individuals fleeing war-zones and to local citizens.

Over 25 new partner organizations provided brand new or used equipment for people with disabilities.

Most of the humanitarian cargo, including rehabilitation equipment and items for distribution, came from the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), The Wheelchair Foundation (USA), Project Hope (USA) and The Legacy of War.




### **Transportation Program**

Approximately 117 children and youth received daily transportation services using the Centre's minibuses

7 minibuses transport children and youth to Dzherelo's programs daily.

1 minibus is used for the Early Intervention home visits program.

The Centre's bus fleet was updated and with the help of the Renovabis Fund (Germany) we obtained a new minivan plus 2 minibuses equipped with lifts for transporting individuals with disabilities.



Since the beginning of the full-scale invasion, Dzherelo Centre's team has been focusing its efforts on assisting children and youth with disabilities, including those that have been internally displaced.

# In this terrible war, everyone has their own "front"

List of assistance given during the first months of the war

- → In the Centre's premises, we opened a shelter for the temporary housing of over 400 people with disabilities and their families or caregivers from 11 regions of Ukraine and over 30 various settlements affected by the war.
- → >2000 hot lunches and breakfasts were prepared by Dzherelo Centre's cooks for the internally displaced individuals with disabilities and their families.



- → 25 Dzherelo staff members organized a 24 hour Assistance Booth at the train station to support people with disabilities. Day and night, they were on hand to assist them with registration, resettlement and to accompany them as necessary.
- → For over 2 months the Centre's minibuses were made available nightly near the regional administration buildings of Lviv to help refugees with disabilities relocate in the city during evening hours.
- → We obtained and distributed over 25 tons of humanitarian aid.

- → We secured specific medications for over 500 children with disabilities.
- → We handed over provisions to more than 50 partner organizations that included medical supplies, rehabilitation equipment and food.
- More than 300 wheelchairs and other equipment were distributed.
- Over 1000 individual kits of hygiene items were received from Project Hope (USA) and distributed.



- → Humanitarian emergency aid consisting of over 5000 packages and individually purchased items were provided to families thanks to support from the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), Canada-Ukraine Foundation (Canada), Shelter (Ukraine), Returned Peace Corps Volunteers Alliance for Ukraine (USA), Project Hope (USA), Ukrainian National Women's League of America (USA), IPSIA del Trentino ODV (Italy), GlobalGiving (USA) and many donors and partners.
- → Emergency aid was also given to institutions, inclusive education resource centres, schools and shelters with internally displaced children.






Project Emergency Response to the needs of children with developmental difficulties during wartime

From June 2022, along with the United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF), we are implementing an emergency response project for children with developmental difficulties during war, in 7 regions in the west of Ukraine (Lviv, Zakarpattia, Ivano-Frankivsk, Chernivtsi, Ternopil, Volyn, Rivne). From October 2022, the project was expanded to cover all of Ukraine.

Over 9,000 children with developmental difficulties, including those who were internally displaced (60%), obtained consultations and individualized services as determined after a screening and evaluation of their needs (ex. hygiene items, glasses, wheelchairs, orthopedic shoes and other necessary items to optimally normalize the lives of the children and their parents).


A national communication campaign reached over 100,000 persons. The target audience — parents or guardians of children with developmental difficulties, social workers, Early Intervention teams, community activists who lobby for the rights of children with disabilities.

Over 500 professionals from various spheres received training in psychological support, selection of adaptive equipment, development of alternative and supplemental methods of communication.

Another aspect of the emergency response project undertaken together with UNICEF Ukraine, is to support and unify community organizations led by parents of children with disabilities or special educational needs.

Representatives of 57 community organizations from 20 regions of Ukraine are taking part in educational programs to strengthen the advocacy potential and organizational capacity of their organizations during wartime. They are learning best practices in social services for children with disabilities, and can compete for mini-grants in order to implement advocacy initiatives of their own.

During times of crisis, it is especially important to unify the efforts of parents working to protect the rights of children, so that their voices can be heard.

To understand the real barriers to integrating children into community life and satisfying their needs, we carry out surveys involving parents of children with disabilities that have special educational needs.



Together with UNICEF Ukraine and the Ministry of Social Policy of Ukraine, representatives of 16 organizations from municipal and public sectors are being trained to provide Early Intervention services to families of very young children.

Teams of Early Intervention specialists are being trained from the following Regions: Lviv, Ivano-Frankivsk, Ternopil, Cherkasy, Zakarpattia, Kyiv, Poltava, Vynnytsia, Dnipropetrovsk, Kharkiv, Sumy, Kirovohradsk, and Chernihiv regions.

Additionally, during the training sessions, participants will begin working with families to deliver Early Intervention services, while also receiving supervision, support and an opportunity to share professional experience with colleagues from other teams.



## **Expansion**

#### Achieved so far

- → Implementing the Development Strategy 2020-2024, the Dzherelo Centre team is working hard on expansion and the creation of a network of social services comprising Day Programs in the city of Lviv.
- → By the end of 2022, 6 Branches of Dzherelo's Day Program were operating in various districts of Lviv. This was a joint achievement of the Lviv City Council, Lviv Regional Council, grant funders, and benefactors from Ukraine and other countries.
- → Despite all the challenges faced in the last two years because of the pandemic and war, we were still able to successfully repair and equip two new Day Program Branches — on Mykolaichuka Street and in Vynnyky.





# Supported Living Residence

A building, requiring repair and reconstruction, and occupying a territory of 600 meters squared, was given by the Lviv City Council to Dzherelo for the creation of a first municipal Supported Living Residence.

In 2021, substantial work was done regarding documentation, as is required before starting a building project, and subsequently the first reconstruction works in the building were begun!






- → Funds from winning the City of Lviv Community Budget competition
- → Funds from the City of Lviv's Development Budget
- → 150,000 euros from the family of Mychajlo and Petra Zaczkiewicz and friends in Germany
- → One third of the remodeling and reconstruction work has been completed.

In order to continue reconstruction of the building, we will launch a fundraising campaign to obtain the second part of required funds.

### Priorities and Plans for 2023

The staff at Dzherelo Centre have started to prepare for its major expansion. In 2023, Dzherelo will be joined by four new municipal organizations that provide social services for people with challenging life situations in the Lviv community (ie. organizations that help care for elderly persons, for people who are homeless, and for children and families experiencing financial hardships).

The main goal is for Lviv to become a more socially conscious city, where members of the community, including internally displaced persons who find themselves in difficult circumstances, will have professional support and a chance to return to a full life. Also, we wish to unite the efforts of the non-governmental sector, charitable organizations and municipality, the goal being to improve the functioning and social adaptation of residents who are experiencing difficult life circumstances.


#### We plan to

- → establish and synchronize the joint function of all organizations joining Dzherelo.
- → establish a consultationresource centre (a single social contact centre), improving resident access to various services and opportunities available in the community.
- → introduce a monitoring system to measure quality in the delivery of social services.
- → develop volunteer programs and partnerships with community organizations.
- → work on standards for the provision of transitional supported living services as well as their state approval.
- create a social hub with the provision of assistive technologies, funded this year by introducing rehabilitation equipment rentals.





### **Dzherelo Centre's Operating Budget 2021**














Mid Year rate in 2022 (1 USD = 36.5 UAH)

## **Support from Ukraine**




During the pandemic, fundraising in Ukraine transitioned from live events to online activities. Volunteer fundraisers raised money online, ran and swam marathons, etc.

Despite being unable to hold a charitable event due to the pandemic in 2021, this community of benefactors was still able to collect a lot of donations. From the very first days of the full scale invasion, they started to actively raise funds in support of Ukraine and Dzherelo.

At the end of 2022, the Zaczkiewicz family organized three extremely emotional concerts with the participation of soloists from the Veryovka Ukrainian National Choir in support of Dzherelo, again successfully raising charitable donations! We receive all the funds raised by Michael and Petra Zaczkiewicz through grant programs from Caritas International.









Our friends from Germany, school children and teachers from the Lise-Meitner High School in the city of Maxdorf, organized and donated individual gifts for each child at Dzherelo from St. Nicholas. This was very touching and inspiring. We greatly appreciate our friendship and thank you for bringing such excitement and joy to the children, as this is especially meaningful in time of war.

### **GlobalGiving**

GlobalGiving is an American crowd-funding platform, used by Dzherelo for over 5 years in various projects. From 2021–22 we were able to raise charitable donations for two projects, namely one supporting Dzherelo's transportation program as well as emergency support for children during the war. Also, GlobalGiving created a Ukraine Crisis Relief Fund, from which Dzherelo received three emergency grants.

Our friends from the 137th chapter of the Ukrainian National Women's League of America held a UKRAINIAN FASHION SHOW presenting Ukrainian designers and raising five thousand dollars for Dzherelo.

An Australian diaspora organization in the city of Queensland has been holding charitable evenings in support of Dzherelo for several years now.

An army chaplain of the Canadian Armed Forces, Fr. Ivan Nahachewsky, rode 2000 km on his bicycle through the north of Saskatchewan Province in Canada and raised 27 486 dollars! Using these funds, the chaplain bought wheelchairs and also gave a portion of the funds to support Dzherelo and also to the Saskatchewan Knights of Columbus Charitable Foundation.

### **Grant Projects**





#### United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF)

- Along with UNICEF (2022–2023), we are implementing a project of Emergency Response to the needs of children with difficulties during the war. The project has the following components:
  - → emergency support for 9000 children in 7 regions in the west of Ukraine
  - → preparation of Early Intervention mobile teams in 19 regions in Ukraine
  - → trainings and grant competitions for 57 non-governmental organizations to help give voice to parents seeking support for children with disabilities during the war
- We are also implementing a project with UNICEF (2021–2023) for developing alternative communication in schools of the Lviv and Kyiv regions.
   The first children with disabilities in Ukraine have obtained Eye Tracking technology and have gone to school with these progressive devices for alternative communication.

### Renovabis





### Renovabis Fund (Germany)

- In 2021, we completed a project for the reconstruction and enhancement of energy efficiency in Dzherelo's main building. This included waterproofing the foundation, reconstruction of the roof, repair work on the water supply system, ventilation and heating systems and installation of a heating pump and dehumidifier in the pool area. The result is independence from natural gas, being able to maintain the building in proper condition for a long period of time, as well as saving money on utility bills, especially for natural gas.
- Implemented emergency projects during the pandemic with respect to the stability of the organization.
- Implemented two emergency support projects during the first months of the war, to support refugees and the Dzherelo team.
- Implemented a project to obtain two minibuses with wheelchair lifts and one minivan for the Centre's Transportation program.





# Won and implemented a project supported by the Ukrainian Fund VPLYV

Joint financing for remodeling the Branch in Vynnyky enabled the purchase of appliances and some furnishings for the Branch as well, plus food boxes for 400 families with children with disabilities, and for people in Lviv hospitals.



# Zagoriy Foundation supported the "Friends of Dzherelo" project

The "Friends of Dzherelo" project in Ukraine — is the development of a community of benefactors who support the Centre with monthly contributions. 180 such benefactors support the Centre with regular monthly donations.



# Support from the Primate's World Relief and Development Fund (Canada)

Implementation of this project allowed us to obtain an electric boiler, generator and voltage stabilizer.



### IPSIA del Trentino ODV (Italy)

Provided grant funding to purchase 1400 emergency kits for families of internally displaced persons.



#### Caritas International Fund

Provided a grant for humanitarian aid in support of refugees during the winter months.



Foundation For Change — a Ukrainian charitable organization that financed carrying out a sociological study of the quality of social services provision in our community.

Mini project supported by the United Nations Population Fund in Ukraine, to conduct art therapy activities for youth for 2 months.

Implementation of a grant from RPCV Alliance for Ukraine (NGO

# **Training and Development**



#### License

In 2021, Dzherelo obtained a medical license (decision of Ukraine's Ministry of Health of from 23/15/2020 N°2915). On this basis, the Centre houses medical practices of various specialties including: Medical Psychology, Pediatric Psychiatry, Physical and Rehab Medicine, Pediatric Neurology, Public Health Management; and after obtaining a junior baccalaureate degree: Nurse Practitioner.





### **European Membership**

On October 15, 2022 the General Assembly officially recognized Dzherelo Centre's membership in the European Association of Service providers for Persons with Disabilities (Brussels).

Dzherelo Centre is the only approved Ukrainian member organization, which is a great responsibility.



# Educational project of the Shkilnyk-Kingham Fund

From November 3, 2020 our four practitioners are being trained in the Second Level course of "Video Interaction Guidance" and in the coming year they will become certified trainers of this effective method! This lengthy and exciting training program is possible with the generous financial support of the Shkilnyk-Kingham Fund and CUF.



Five of Dzherelo's staff therapists have now completed their studies and received Master Degrees from the Ukrainian Catholic University's School of Rehabilitation Medicine, with support from the Ukrainian Canadian Foundation of Taras Shevchenko (Canada).





## **Dzherelo Centre's Training Programs**

Dzherelo Centre has become a provider of continuous professional development for medical personel. Because medical professionals must undergo some training every year, they can take traditional courses at faculties of postgraduate institutions or academies of postgraduate education or they can receive training at the Dzherelo Centre, as one of the providers of continuous professional development.

Implemented piloting of the standard of day program services for children with disabilities, taking into account the accessibility of obtaining these services for children with complex challenges.

Created new educational programs of informal training for assistants of children in inclusive programs at schools as well as for caregivers of people with disabilities.

A team of staff members from the Orphanage in Ternopil underwent a training course on day program provision from the team at Dzherelo. Two teams of Early Intervention from Vinnytsia and Rivne took a training course at Dzherelo on "Organizing the Provision of Early Intervention Services".

Dzherelo conducted trainings to prepare parent-leaders to facilitate peer support groups in the partnership project from the European Association of Service Providers for Persons with Disabilities (EASPD) and UNICEF — Emergency Early Childhood Development Support for Ukrainian Refugees (ECDUR).

Conducted training for staff of the Administrative Services Centres and the Police about interacting and communicating with persons with disabilities.

- → the Second National Congress of Physical and Rehabilitation Medicine in December 2021 — delivered 4 lectures
- → the work of the National Council of Early Intervention, with respect to the development of a regulatory-legal base for the service

- → the Congress of the Ukrainian Society of Physical and Rehabilitation Medicine, Kyiv.
- → a training session on "Flower of Stability" working with a person's resources.

- → resource groups for specialists who deliver services under new circumstances for that country, NGO SOFT Tulip (Netherlands)
